

## **BODMIN OLD CORNWALL SOCIETY**

# CORNISH CROSS ON THE OLD CALLYWITH ROAD, BODMIN

The Cross is a Grade II listed building which marks the boundary between Bodmin and Cardinham. It was first recorded in 1613 as the "Greedetch Cross" because it stands at the junction with the Great Ditch which bounded land owned by Bodmin Priory. The Cross has a decorated wheel-head and stands to an approximate height of 1.8 metres.

It is a Wayside Cross whose main function was to mark the route to the Parish Church. It was also used to mark tracks to the sites of pilgrimages, monastic sites, ancient Chapels and Holy Wells.

On an 1840 tithe map can be seen a track from Callywith to Clerkenwater known as

"The Church Path". There is a mention of a "Chapel over the hill" recorded in 1157. It is also stated that there is a site of an old Holy Well at Penbugle.

Callywith is just outside the borough boundary and gave its name to one of the toll gates on the 1769 Bodmin Moor turnpike (now the A30). The road leading from Bodmin Moor to Castle Street which was the main route into Bodmin until the Launceston Road was cut through Barn Park in 1834.

The word Callywith was derived from the Cornish word "Kellywyth" meaning "wood".



## THE BODMIN WASSAIL 2021

The Bodmin Wassail looks like being very different on Wednesday 6th January 2021 than it has been for the last 397 years. For those who are unaware we are in the habit of entering, (on invitation) homes or businesses to bring good health and good cheer for the coming year. With the current Covid 19 regulations we cannot enter homes and are limited to six people. The latter is a difficult decision for our dedicated wassailers; some willing to travel from Dorset. London and even New Zealand.

Never-the-less the wassail will take place in some form, it has survived world wars, we are not going to let this virus be the break in a very long chain. As far as we know we are the only visiting wassail left in the country, certainly the only one with an unbroken tradition. So how are we going to continue?

If things return to normal, so will we. If the Covid rules remain we will reduce to six and remain outside properties regardless of the weather, observing always the distancing guidelines. If total

lock down occurs our only course will be to go virtual via the media.

## Biggest investment for 50 years

Bodmin has 3 brand new routes, brand new buses and 4 new bus shelters, all with up to the minute information when your bus will arrive.

This has been years in planning. It is part of a major public transport boost by Cornwall council also including new trains and train services so people can leave their cars behind and help the planet.

The new bus services are the 176 from Bodmin Parkway through Bodmin to Launceston every 2 hours. The 89 with useful links across Bodmin before a more direct link to Truro than before. The 10 from Bodmin Parkway through Bodmin, Wadebridge, Polzeath and Camelford to

Launceston, every hour to Wadebridge. Together there is a much improved service to Bodmin Parkway especially as the 11a evening service has resumed.

For the person who is sick, we pray for the gift of healing.


For the person who is desperate, we pray for the gift of hope.

## **MAYORALTY HOUSE (AND ASSIZE COURTS)**

In 1837, upon the removal of the summer assizes from Launceston to Bodmin and because of an Act of Parliament, it became desirable to provide additional accommodation for the Courts. Accordingly, the old church of the Grey Friars (usually called the Refectory) was taken down, and new courts with convenient accommodation for the grand iury etc. re erected on the site. The front is built of granite ashlar, and, though plain, has a good and substantial appearance. At the same time the Judges' Lodgings were rebuilt in a similar manner from a design by Mr Joseph Pascoe of this town. The expense was borne by the County. The architect and contractor was Mr Burt of Launceston.

In 1874 an advertisement appeared in the West Briton: to let Mayoralty House for a term of fourteen years. The house having been expressly built as lodgings for the judges, the taker will be required to furnish the same to the satisfaction of the Town Council, and to accommodate the judges

and their retinue at the Lent and Summer assizes, from which a large pecuniary advantage annually accrues to the tenant. Bodmin having been selected as the military depot centre for the county of Cornwall, an excellent opportunity now offers itself to any one desirous of keeping a high class lodging-house, for which purpose the above property is admirably adapted".

Nb: The Mayoralty always had a resident family. The House stands on the righthand side of the entrance to the Priory Park and is where the Town Council Offices are

#### **OUR BEAUTIFUL PLACES**

**St Petroc's church** in Bodmin is one of our beautiful places. Many associate it with worship or numerous events both private and public. Have you really looked around inside though? Have you shown your children the hundreds of years of history within its walls and outside? The church is open and full of historically important contents. Here are three to look out for:

The **Norman Font** (see picture) with its intricate masonry carving displaying a message in itself – many people have been baptised here.

Displayed within a somewhat tarnished glazed case on the West wall of the South Aisle are copies of some pages of the **Bodmin Gospels** which

dates from the end of the 9th century to the early part of the 11th. It is mainly written in Latin and Old English but also has the earliest written examples of the Cornish language. In addition, records were added to the Book recording the freeing of slaves. The original Book is held at the British Library, but much more information can be found via Google or YouTube. One of the many proposed Plans to enhance the Visitor experience in St. Petroc's is to create an interactive display of the Bodmin Gospels, so as to be of benefit to history students and scholars alike.



Numerous memories of the **Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry** (DCLI), which was a light infantry regiment of the British Army in existence from 1881 to 1959, can be found. 22 individual DCLI memorials are sited at various locations around the Church, and descriptive 'handouts' are available for visitor's information. There are also intricate stained-glass windows, in memory of families but also the Fallen of the DCLI. Looking up in the roof space of the Soldiers Chapel, dating from the 19th century, you will see the DCLI colours suspended.



#### **CORNWALL SAMARITANS**

## 50 YEARS AND STILL LISTENING

Back in 1970 Samaritans opened its Cornwall branch at Treyew Road in Truro and celebrates its 50th birthday this year. Over the past year, the centre took over 30,000 contacts by telephone, email or from face-to face visitors. The branch is staffed by over 100 listening volunteers, and an additional 25 support volunteers.

Sue Wright (Director) commented "I know Samaritans provide such a vital service for so many people, particularly during the last six months, and I have the greatest respect for all our volunteers and what they do."

The centre has been able to function during this difficult time, but all Outreach events and fundraising initiatives, including the Samaritans National Walk and branch birthday celebrations have

been cancelled. Every volunteer, however, has been given a medallion of Cornish tin to mark this important milestone.

Jeremy Gilbert, of St Justin, said "As a Cornish company we were extremely honoured to be asked to design a medallion





for the local branch of the Samaritans, who have done such an amazing job in Cornwall for the past 50 years."

Volunteer Penny 191 a volunteer, at the Truro centre, for over forty-five years. "We're let into our callers' lives when they are troubled and feel that they are unable to share their concerns with anyone else."

The comprehensive Samaritan training programme has been online, and one of the latest cohort of volunteers Rachel

NS41, commented "I've called Samaritans as a last resort, knowing they'd helped me so much before. I can't remember the name of the volunteer I spoke to. I'm so grateful to someone I'll never meet. I wanted to become 'that person' for as many people as I could, and 2020 seems like the perfect year to start my training."

### SMALL DONATIONS DELIVER GREAT VALUE

There are two baskets in St. Petroc's Church, a large container for items destined for the Food Bank, and you will be aware of how an increased number of people have need of food since the Covid pandemic took hold, and the smaller one for used postage stamps and other collectables (e.g. postcards or any coins) for the Leprosy Mission.



Leprosy causes nerve damage which makes hands and feet numb. As a result cuts and burns easily go unnoticed and ulcers can develop. The trials of a new treatment are promising and healing time is halved. Caring for leprosy patients and the new trial need funding and by cutting the stamps from your Christmas card envelopes, with a small amount of paper around each stamp, will provide income at no cost to you except a little effort.

As you visit the Christmas Tree Festival in St. Petroc's Church, from 9th December, please place your Food Bank offerings, such as tinned salmon, Christmas puddings, chocolates, biscuits, cranberry

sauce, stuffing, pickles and long life milk, and stamps in the appropriate basket and they will be gratefully appreciated by those who benefit.



Two collections of 5p coins have been handed in to help the growing but struggling Anglican church in Peru. The fund has now topped £100 which will be sent out to Peru, with pleasure as soon as lock down has lifted. Many thanks to all who save the collections, it is surprising how those little coins mount up and do good work.



#### ST LAWRENCE HOSPITAL

#### A town within a town!

Growing up in Bodmin I realise how important the hospital was for employment! Our family alone had twelve members working there!

There was a Pharmacy, providing all medication. The main stores ordered all provisions, a butchers was at the rear and supplied the kitchen. A store upstairs catered for every clothing and linen request from Ward Sisters.

The Laundry cleaned everything, dry cleaned if necessary, several Domestics were employed. There was a cobblers and a Fire Station and at one time the mortuary was in this area.

Foster Building was where you would find the kitchen, Bakers, Cooks and Kitchen assistants. They provided all the food for the wards and the Staff dining room where there were several more employed. In the Builders yard were Builders, Painters, Electricians, Plumbers and Carpenters. There were two shops (called Male and Female Canteens) most things could be bought from these.

Now come the therapies, in the Occupational Therapy building there was a Hairdressers, Barbers, and a cookery kitchen for patients who liked to cook. Recreation Therapy were responsible for organising Dances, Parties, Entertainment and Sport activities. There

was a Hospital Farm down in the valley below the hospital, often teams of staff and patients would go there to work. The Overall running of the hospital was from the Front Office, this included Wages Office, Patients Finance Office and the Typist pool. In Kendall block Medical Records were kept, and next door were the Medical Secretaries.

The church at town end is called St Lawrence's Church, if you have never visited it I would recommend you do so even if just to see the lovely glass windows behind the altar! When I first worked in the hospital Rev Jenkins visited the wards and took the services in the church, the congregation consisted of patients who wished to attend and local townsfolk. After Mr Jenkins retirement the Rev. Roger Mitchell came with his wife and family, he was well known and well-liked by patients and Staff alike!

#### **BODMIN KEEP**


New COVID secure First World War. Second World War and Remembrance loans boxes for local schools and colleges are now offered by Bodmin Keep. The boxes support teaching in the classroom, link to the national curriculum and are an ideal starting point for promoting and developing observation, critical thinking, problem solving, questioning and empathising skills. Object handling encourages learners to engage their senses by feeling weights and textures, examining mechanisms and surface finishes, listening to sounds and even smelling for clues about use. Fach of the boxes includes a mixture of original and reproduction objects some of which are over one hundred years old! Each box comes with teachers' notes which give context and historical information about the objects and ready to use resources.

#### Child of War session loans box

Schools and colleges can also hire a loans box where learners will explore what it was like to be a child during World War Two. During group work and investigative activities with real and replica objects, themes including rationing, evacuation and play are explored. This box includes all the resources needed to deliver the session including a lesson plan, PowerPoint showing what life would have been like for children in Cornwall during the war and teachers' notes. "The resources

accompanied with the session plan made everything so easy to run and helped to bring the topic to life. In the current climate with it being difficult to get children out on school trips, this was a superb way of bringing the trip to the children. I'd recommend this to other teachers as having the session plan with the activity resources saves so much time and enables you to maximise the resources." **KS2 Bodmin teacher**

#### **Christmas Tree Festival 2020**

We can hardly believe it has been 17 years since the start of the fabulous Christmas Tree Festival in St Petroc's Church, where annually with other organisations in the community we have displayed our Tree of Remembrance.

The BFS tree in silver and blues is usually situated close to the altar in the smaller Soldiers aisle and due to demand is increasing in size every year. Initially we

decorate the tree by placing a bauble with the name of every person we have had the privilege of looking after during that year. However, our wish is to give everyone visiting the festival the chance to remember their loved ones. To this purpose, we provide a large basket of spare decorations and labels to allow people to add the names of their family members who have died.

Christmas is a particular time of year for remembering with fondness those who are no longer with us, but we also recognise that it is the most difficult time for those recently bereaved and we hope that this small act offers comfort to honour treasured memories. Many people have commented how special the BFS tree has become to them and how they return every year to include their loved ones.

We are delighted to have our tree on display again this year and although we have put in place precautions, please bring your own pens so we can stay COVID friendly!
